Review of Vocational Education (RoVE) – MITO

The Review of Vocational Education sees the dissolution of Industry Training Organisations, at the end of the year MITO, who currently arrange and deliver training for the Port Industry, will transfer to the newly formed provider – Te Pūkenga.

What does this mean for the Port Industry and the New Zealand Certificate in Port Operations?

The Port Industry along with the Crane Industry need to find a new entity to manage their training. Both Industries are aligned in their desire for:

- Control over their own destiny
- Increased quality of training and training outcomes
- Cost effective accessible training
- Efficient, effective training
- Preferred option for both industries is their own joint PTE
- Doing this jointly brings the industries together, makes a PTE more viable and gives the ability to influence

The Port and Crane Industries are committed to the best solution for learners across both sectors, therefore it was agreed a joint Private Training Enterprise (PTE) would be formed as the preferred option for both industries, to ensure they have control over their own destiny, increase the quality of training and training outcomes, identify synergies between industries and take advantage of opportunities presented.

Port & Crane Academy of New Zealand, reflects the merging of two industries and shows the commitment to lifting the training standard across both sectors.

There are three appointed directors from the Port sector, Adam Harvey (PIA Chairperson) Jeremy Christmas, (Chairperson Education and Training committee) and Jacqui Ramsay (PIA Executive officer) along with three appointed directors from CANZ. We are in the process of getting NZQA approval for the PTE, all the training we have developed we will maintain ownership of and will transfer to the new PTE to be delivered. This will ensure the quality of training, the cost of the training and that we maintain control. It can be a complicated process for those that aren't familiar with the education sector, but we have employed a consultant along with CANZ going 50/50 to help us develop and deliver, it is not a huge cost, but will ensure the correct process is followed.

The Port Industry Health and Safety Committee

This committee, led by Chairperson Pat Kirk, is made up of Industry health and safety specialists who meet and discuss projects and areas of focus throughout the year.

The aim is to share expertise, knowledge and experiences across the port sector to achieve the best safety outcomes for all. Strong relationships have been built with key regulators over a period of time which are now showing benefit.

The committee is recognised by the Regulators as the health and safety touch point for the port sector. Regulators now pro-actively approach the PIA to consult on key port sector initiatives and projects seeking feedback, advice, and guidance.

The PIA was heavily involved, and continue to be, in the creation and formation of port sector COVID-19 management strategies and initiatives. Our involvement with various border sector working groups has given the Government agencies the ability to seek information and feedback from the entire port sector quickly and efficiently.

Our lobbying of specific aspects with Government officials has also played a huge part in the education of key Ministers and their advisors in terms of port sector risk profiles and the type and range of effective controls developed and adopted across the port sector.

Port Sector Health and Safety Strategy Project

Maritime New Zealand and Worksafe Project Managers have actively engaged with the Port Industry HSE committee throughout the different phases of the project.

Significant time and resources have been supplied by the PIA and its members to enable this initiative to gain momentum. After considerable consultation between all the involved parties, two foundation projects were agreed upon.

- Creation of an Industry specific Fatigue Risk Management System (FRMS) template to provide all port user groups with a hands on framework and guidance tools to enable the establish a FRMS tailored to any organisation no matter their scale or complexity.
- Creation of a port sector specific innovation search tool to assist quick and effective identification of available technologies that could be utilised to address the people vs plant critical risk within the port sector.

It is envisaged that this initiative will continue to be used as the mechanism by which tripartite project work will continue within the sector. This will provide long term strategic benefits to the industry, with the PIA being an active member of the project group gives the membership a pivotal role in the creation and formation of these projects.



Workshops

The PIA is committed to provide workshops on Industry topics to benefit all members. One we are working on is "Sleep Education" to be presented by Dr Grace Vincent. As Grace is based in Australia we need the boarders to open and alert levels to settle to progress this.



Dr Grace Vincent is a sleep researcher and Senior Lecturer at the Appleton Institute in Adelaide, Australia. She has spent the last 10 years investigating how to improve sleep in our communities. Her work particularly focuses on

workers in high risk industries, many of who are shiftworkers. Dr Vincent has over 70 peer-reviewed publications and more than \$1 million in research funding. She has international collaborations with Washington State University, Monash University and NASA.

We would look to give a 35 min presentation with 15 min Q&A delivered online.

- Overview of basics of sleep science,
- health and safety impacts of inadequate sleep,
- managing shiftwork.

Followed at a later date by an interactive full day workshop on Sleep Health. Along with the above topics being expanded, other topics covered will be:

- Sleep Hygiene
- The dual responsibility framework for fatigue management
- Rostering and sleep leadership
